SUBJECT: Report on Planning and Execution of Operations of Mission #191 of the 92nd Bombardment Group, 9 September 1944, Mannheim, Germany.

- TO : Commanding Officer, 92nd Bombardment Group (H) AAF, APO #557.
- l. Comment on Planning and Execution.

 a. The bomb loading for this operation was received from Headquarters

 40th Combat Wing by Capt. Smyrl at 2227 hours, 8 September 1944. The order called for thirty-nine (39) B-17's to be loaded with M-17 x 500 lb. I,B. Bombs.
- b. The Field Order was received from Headquarters, 1st Bomb Division by Capt. Smyrl at 2227 hours, 8 September 1944. Flight plans and details of the mission were completed, briefing being set for 0415 hours and take-off time 0710 hours.
- 2. General Narrative.

 2. Thirty-nine (39) a/c including two (2) PFF a/c and three (3) spares of the 92nd Bomb Group began take-off at 0805 hours for assembly on the Honeybourne Buncher at 10.000, 11,000, and 12,000 feet. These a/c formed the Lead, Low, and High granger of the 40th "A" Combat Wing. This Combat Wing was the seventh of the 1st Air wivid Division.
- bT The Wing departed the Buncher on time and flew the ordered route over England, arriving at the Coast in time for an excellent Air Division assembly. The planned route was flown to the I.P. where a decision was made to attack the target by use of PFF technique as was suggested by the weather scouting force. The target was attacked through 10/10th cloud cover at 105½ hours from 25,000 feet, the entire wing dropping on the lead PFF aircraft.
- c. After the target, the wing returned along the briefed route reaching base at 1420 hours.
 - 3. Aircraft Not Attacking.

 2. A/C 44-6120. This a/c returned early because of sick pilot.
- 4. Aircraft Lost.

 2. A/C 42-31783. This a/c was seen to leave the formation at the continental coast on the return flight. It turned back into France with an engine feathered. It was not see to be hit or on fire. No chutes were seen.
