SUBJECT: Report on Planning and Execution of Operations Of Mission 9 March 1944, Berlin.

TO : Commanding Officer, 92nd Bombardment Group (H) AAF, LPO 634.

1. Comment on Planning and Execution.

a. The bomb loading for this operation was received from Headquarters 40th Combat Wing by Capt. Prasse at 2100 hours 8 March 1944. The order called for twenty (20) B-17's and six (6) spares aircraft from the 92nd Bomb Group to be loaded with 10 x 500 GP Bombs with 1/10 nose, 1/100 tail fusing, plus one (1) aircraft from the 482nd Bomb Group.

b. The Field Order was received from Headquarters 1st Bomb Division by Capt. Prasse at 2232 hours 8 March 1944. Flight plans and details of the mission were completed, briefing being set for 0440 hours and take-off time 0750 hours.

2. General Narrative.

a. 92nd Bomb Group (Lead Group 40th Combat Wing)

(1) Take-off was accomplished by twenty (20) B-17's plus six (6) spare B-17's from the 92nd Bomb Group and one (1) aircraft from the 482nd Bomb Group beginning at 0750 hours. The assembly for the main group was made over Rodington on the 40th Combat Wing buncher as shown in Diagram "A". The six (6) spare B-17's formed a high squadron of the High Group 40th Combat Wing buncher as shown in Diagram "B". The formation departed the 40th Combat Wing buncher at 0817 hours flying as lead group of the 40th Combat Wing.

b. The route out was followed according to flight plan and the English coast was departed at 1001 hours. The enemy coast was entered at 1053 hours at an altitude of 22,700 feet. The I.P. was reached at 1148 hours which was forty-five (45) minutes late due to wind changes. At the I.P. a complete undercast covered the primary target and therefore the Secondary Target, the center of Berlin, was attacked. Bombs were dropped on the lead aircraft from the 482nd Bomb Group on a magnetic heading of 255 degrees at 1355 hours from 24,700 feet. The formation over the target is shown in Diagram "C". The 92nd Bomb Group rallied successfully with the low and high groups of the 40th Combat Wing after the target and then began a descent. The English Coast was crossed at 1600 hours and the lead aircraft reached the base at 1650 hours.

3. Aircraft Not Attacking.

a. Twenty (20) B-17's plus six spares from the 92nd Bomb Group, and one (1) aircraft from the 482nd Bomb Group took off.

b. Of the twenty-seven (27) aircraft taking off the following did not attack.

(1) One (1) A/C # 42-3590 crashed three minutes after take off.

(2) Four (4) A/C numbers 42-31713, 42-12550, and 42-3476 returned. These are unused spares.

(3) Two (2) A/C aborted just before the enemy coast because of mechanical trouble.

c. Of the twenty (20) A/C attacking four (4) attacked a target of opportunity.

4. Aircraft Los.

- a. 42-3546 - This A/C crashed and burned three minutes after take-off, reasons for crash unknown.
- b. 42-31564 - This A/C was observed to have left the formation under control before the target. Reason Unknown.
- c. 42-31772 - This A/C was observed to have left the formation under control before the target. Reason unknown.
