SUBJECT: Report on Planning and Execution of Operational Mission, 8 November 1944, Merseburg, Germany.

TO : Commanding Officer, 92nd Bombardment Group(H)AAF,APO #557.

l. Comment on Planning and Execution.

<u>a.</u> The bomb loading for this operation was received from Headquarters 40th Combat Wing by Capt Stroud at 1100 hours ? November 1944. The order called for thirty-four (34) B-17's plus three (3) spares and two (2) PFF a/c to be loaded with 10 x 500 lb. GP bombs, each with 1/10 second nose fuse and 1/40 second tail fuse.

<u>b.</u> The Field Order was received from Headquarters, 1st Bomb Division by Capt Stroud at 0350 hours, 8 November 1944. Elight plans and details of the mission were completed, briefing being set for 0400 hours and take-off time 0655 hours.

2. General Narrative.

a. Thirty-nine (39) aircraft, including two (2) PFF a/c and three (3) spares of the 92nd Group began take-off at 0655 hours for assembly on the Podington Buncher at 12,000, 13,000 and 14,000 feet as Lead, Low and High Squadrons of the 40th "A" Group, 7th in the 1st Air Division.

b. The Group accomplished assembly on the assigned Buncher and departed anxious on course, 5 minutes early, following the briefed route over England, making "S" turns to lose time, and departed the coast on time. The Group departed the Coast 12 miles south of course because of congestion and cloud conditions at control point #1.

c. The 40th "A" Group passed control point #2 on time, on course and continued on the briefed route. Receiving information from the weather scout, the Group attacked the secondary target on PFF in group formation 8 minutes late, with bombs away at 1108 hours on a heading of 089 degrees true from 24,100 feet true. A right turn was made off the target, and the briefed route was flown on withdrawal to mid-channel.

d. At mid-channel, the Group separated into smaller units because of cloud conditions. The Leader turned north and entered the English Coast at Lowestoft at 3000 feet, where there were breaks in the heavy clouds. Base was reached at 1530 hours.
